

Sad Discovery

Limerick Parish Clerk Found Dead

Inquest Evidence

James Dillon, Parish Clerk of the combined parishes of Knockaderry and Cloonacagh (West Limerick) was found dead in a pool of water at Ahalia, about half way between the two churches in the joint parishes. The deceased, who had held the position of Parish Clerk for more than forty years, left a widow and a large young family to mourn his loss.

Mr M. E. Quinn, solicitor, Corofin for West Limerick, held an inquest at Knockaderry into the circumstances connected with the death of deceased.

Supo. P. McNamee, Newcastle West, and Sergeant O'Donnell, Kilnedy, represented the authorities.

Evidence of identification was given by Mrs McNamee, sister of deceased.

Mrs. McNamee gave evidence of having found the deceased partly submerged in the pool. The lower part of the body was in the water.

In reply to a member of the jury, witness said that the pool was situated in close proximity to a public path leading from Cloonacagh to Knockaderry between the two churches. It was possible for a person to fall into the pool.

Guard Goggin, Kilnedy, said the position of the body would be consistent with the deceased falling into the pool.

Dr J. W. Dineen, Newcastle West, said that the deceased died from asphyxia following drowning, and that jury returned a verdict accordingly.

The coroner, Supo. McNamee and Mr. M. Boagie, S.T., foreman of the jury, expressed sympathy with the widow and family of deceased.
