ber life, nor said she was tired of life. The jury returned a verdict in accord. ance with the medical evidence that death was due to asphyxia, adding that there was no evidence as to how deceased got into the water.

Dr J Tynan, house surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, stated that he bad carried out a post mortem examination which revealed that death was due to asphyxia following immersion in water.
