Under the Order they could fix one-fourth of the arable land as the area to be tilled, but they actually fixed the area of land capable of producing a fair crop, so that the defendants got every fair play Justice D. F. Gleeson said the in spectors were reasonable men, and did not estimate to the last decimal point the area to be tilled. They inspected farms, and as reasonable men having a knowledge of what the farmers could be expected to do, estimated the area to be tilled.
