

ABBEYFEALE COURT

Larceny And Assault Cases

Mr. W. H. Molony, B.L., D.J., adjudicated at Abbeyfeale District Court.

Five young men—Michael, Cornelius and John J. Broderick, Con Healy and Patrick O'Donnell, resident in the parish—were charged with a long list of bicycles and cycle parts larcenies, covering a considerable time.

On reviewing the charges, the Justice decided limiting them within the period allowed by statute, and such as were supported by evidence of identification and of being in possession of stolen property.

Defendants consented to be tried by the Justice.

Supt. M. McKenna, G.S., prosecuted, and Mr. R. A. MacAulay, solicitor, represented all the defendants, except John J. Broderick.

Patrick Leahy, Cratloe, Athea, identified a bicycle stolen from New Street, Abbeyfeale, on the night of 23rd August last and value for £4. The saddle was not his.

John Broderick, Ballaugh, identified a bicycle stolen from New Street on 3rd October. The saddle was missing and some other parts. A saddle produced was his.

Dan Sheehan identified a dynamo lamp stolen from his bicycle at Convent Street. The dynamo and headlamp were torn from the brackets and were value for 30/-.

Michael Harnett identified a similar lamp taken from same place on 1st November.

Sergeant Normile, Guard King, and D.O. Carty read long precautioned statements signed by each of the defendants.

After a hearing of 2½ hours, the District Justice sentenced Con Broderick to one month's imprisonment in each of two cases; P. O'Donnell, on charge of receiving property, to three months imprisonment; John J. Broderick to six months in each of two charges, to run consecutively, and also to one month each in the charges of stolen dynamos, the latter two to run concurrently.

Con Healy, 15½ years, had his father added as defendant, and a fine of 5/- in each of three charges was imposed and £2 compensation, as well as being bound to the peace for two years.

DANCE HALL INCIDENT.

John J. O'Connell, Kilconlea, represented by Mr. MacAulay, solr., summoned Patrick Woulfe (junr.) and his brothers, Philip and Richard, for assault at Kilconlea Dance Hall on 2nd January.

Mr. M. F. Noonan, solr. (Messrs. P. T. Liston and Co.), defended.

Complainant said he owned the Kilconlea Dance Hall, and on 27th December the defendant, Patrick, assaulted his son. When he came to the dance on New Year's night, Patrick paid at the door, and he told him he should conduct himself and sit down. Patrick said—"Have you an objection to me?" Richard and Philip then came to the door, and held his hands and he was pulled out and struck by the three of them. He was covered with blood and couldn't sit down.

Mrs. O'Connell also gave evidence.

Dr. Ed. Harnett said that on 2nd January he attended complainant. His right eye was closed up, and was blood shot. A small bone was broken in the nose. There were some abrasions on the ear and a cut on the eyebrow.
