HUMAN REMAINS

Found In Field

While working in a field in the neighbourhood of Sweep's Cross, which lies on the main road between Newcastle West and Rathkeale, Mr. Daniel Enright, Ballingown, came upon portion of a human skeleton. The remains, which consisted of a skull and a number of bones, were in a very advanced stage of decomposition and were located about a foot and a half under the surface of the ground.

There was no evidence of identification, and the only clues found near the scene of the discovery were a penknife and a button, both of which, it was stated, fell to pieces when handled. Complete mystery surrounds the discovery, and the condition of the skeleton would seem to suggest that it must have been buried for a considerable number of years. Across the road from where the remains were found stand a dwelling and out-offices erected by the late Deane Shelton on what is understood to have been a graveyard in far-off times. The nearest cemetery in use in the locality is that at Grange, a mile and a half or so to the north-east of Newcastle West.

News of the discovery was conveyed to the Garda authorities, and the remains were subsequently removed under the supervision of Supt. McKenna, G.S., Newcastle West, and Sergt. Walsh, Ardagh. Mr. M. E. Cussen, solr., Rathkeale, Coroner for West Limerick, was also communicated with, and it is possible that an inquest may be held. Meanwhile the remains were sent for examination to Doctor McGrath, State Pathologist.

Inquiries made locally throw no light on the mystery of the remains. There has been no report of any person missing within the past twenty-five or thirty years, and the only possible explanation seems to be connected with the old graveyard situated across the road and which has been out of commission for a very long time. The skull and about fourteen bones were all that were left of the skeleton, and although the skull was in a very advanced stage of decay the teeth were almost perfect.

It was stated that the question of holding an inquest has been deferred pending instructions from the Attorney-General, to whom the full facts have been communicated.

NEWPORT COURT CLAIM FOR £

Tillage And Assault Cases

At Newport District Court, Mr. J. M. Flood, B.L., District Justice, adjudicated.

The Minister for Agriculture summoned John Ryan, Kineen, for having supplied a quantity of contaminated milk, to the Newport Co-operative Creamery, contrary to the Agricultural Produce Act.

Newport Co-operative Creamery Society was summoned for having accepted the milk.

Mr. J. J. O'Brien, State Solicitor, prosecuting, said that both parties admitted the offence.

John Ryan was fined £1, and a fine of £3 was imposed on the Newport Co-operative Society.
