fertiliser. Finish the planting of all fruits.

FLOWER GARDEN

Make a hotbed under a frame, and sow sweet pea, antirrhinums, cauliflower, first early cabbage, early tomatoes, etc.

Freshen the caked soil among spring flowering plants such as wallflowers, etc.

Fork in some decayed manure to the herbaceous border. Now is a good time to lift, divide and transplant herbaceous plants.

VEGETABLE GARDEN

Prick the ground between autumn planted onions, lettuce and cabbage. Plant shallots and potato onions, renew stakes and ties on all trees.

Collect stakes for peas, sweet pea and runner beans. Dig and manure trenches for these.

Finish the digging for parsnips, and the digging and manuring for onions, potatoes, peas and beans.

All the above items will be discussed at the gardening class at the City Technical Institute to-night (Friday, the 5th) at 8 o'clock.
