REFUTATION!

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JUDGE AND COURT STATEMENT

Refutation of a statement concerning lavatory accommodation in the City was made by Circuit Court Judge T. O'Donnell, S.C., at the Court yesterday. He said that during the hearing of a case last week a statement was made to the effect that there were several shops in the city where men and women worked throughout the day with no lavatory accommodation whatever. “I at once thought this was a very strange condition of affairs in a city the size and progress of Limerick,” said the Judge, “and knowing the repute of its public representatives, I spoke to the Mayor and consulted with him and I have brought here the City Manager and Sanitary Officer. They tell me there is not one word of truth in that statement, so that the City of Limerick should not be slandered in that way by a statement to the effect that there are houses in which men and women work without sanitary accommodation.”

The Judge then called to the witness stand both the City Manager (Mr. J. J. Berkery) and the Sanitary Inspector (Mr. S. Frost), and they both confirmed the refutation.
