DIED AT HIS WORK

The death of Mr. Daniel McMahon, only son of Mr. and Mrs. John McMahon, farmers, Tullyleague, Glin, caused a shock to his bereaved family and the general public (writes our Glin correspondent.) He had been engaged at his farm work when he collapsed and died immediately of heart failure. Deceased, aged 32 years, was of splendid physique. Kindly and gentle as a child, he was a member of an old Glin nationalist family. His funeral to Kilfergus Churchyard was of immense proportions. Several Mass cards were sent his family, and a magnificent wreath, three feet long, was sent by the Knight of Glin and Madame Fitzgerald.

A SMART FINE

At Adare Court, before Mr. C. S. Kenny, B.L., D.J., Patrick Bowen, Ballycummin, Mungret, was summoned for failing to stamp fully the National Health card of an employee named Michael Walsh. Mr. M. F. Noonan, solr. (Messrs. P. T. Liston and Co.), prosecuting (on behalf of Mr. J. J. Power, State Solicitor), said that there were fifty stamps short on Walsh's cards, but this amount had now been paid. The Justice said he intended putting a stop to this type of offence and imposed a fine of £5, with Court costs.

DOING GREAT WORK

During the month of January 3,400 cheap meals were served in the Muintir na Tire restaurant in Tipperary. The meals, which are prepared in the restaurant by a ladies voluntary committee, are taken away for consumption at home by necessitous families. In addition about 30 old men are supplied with meals at a nominal charge at the restaurant daily. This is the second season of the restaurant, which has proved a very successful venture, and to which has been attributed an improvement in the health conditions of the poor people.

TILLAGE DEFAULTERS FINED

For failure to till the acreage required under the Tillage Order, the following were fined by District Justice Kenny, B.L., at Dromcollogher Court:—Denis Culhane, Knockroe Cottage, Castletown, 193 arable acres and 4 acres in default, £10 with £1 ls. expenses and 2/- court costs; Edward Irwin, Lisheensheelia, Kilmeedy, 54 arable acres with only 8½ acres out of 13½ tilled, £12 10s. with £1 ls. expenses and 2/- costs.

At Croom Court, District Justice Kenny imposed the following fines: Patrick Lenihan, Kilbeg, Kilfinny, 92 arable acres and 20 out of 23 acres tilled, fined £3; Jeremiah English, Croom Cottage, quota, 7 acres, tilled only 3, fined £8.

STOLE A RUG

A sentence of three months imprisonment was imposed on a young man named Christopher Canty, Ballycarney, Patrickswell, by District Justice Kenny, at Adare Court, for the larceny of a rug and lamp, the property of George Ruttle, Clarina. Evidence was given that the articles were taken from Mr. Ruttle's car while it was parked at Clarina. Defendant's solicitor (Mr. Martin Tynan) pleaded that Canty was under the influence of drink at the time he stole the articles. A summons against defendant's father, Thomas Canty, for receiving the rug was dismissed.
