MAROONED LIGHTHOUSE CREW

Marooned for 86 days on Black Rock Lighthouse, 12 miles off the North Mayo coast, Keeper Michael O'Connor told a reporter how the lighthouse crew lived while stormtossed seas isolated them from the mainland. Keeper John Scott, after 85 days, is still there. O'Connor said he killed 50 wild birds with a catapult and the keepers made soup of them. "The position became so desperate that we had to make bread with sea water. and sugar gave out before Christmas," he said, "On December 13th the derricks were smashed by the heavy seas and much of the provisions we received on January 15th were destroyed by sea water.'
