Matthew Duggan gave evidence of seeing "every sod in the two stacks" being removed to the roadside by Hickey for removal by the defendant.

Defendant, in evidence, said he purchased the two stacks from plaintiff for £17. Witness removed a lorry load of the turf a couple of days later. He took the second load later and the lorry was only half full. He called three times to Hickey's place with a view to drawing his attention to the size of the second load, but plaintiff was away from home and could not be found. Witness contended that he had not got the full quantity of turf he had made the bargain for. He had only got a lorry load and a half of turf, leaving a like quantity short.

Witness, in reply to Mr. Tynan, admitted that he owed the sum of £10 to Hickey for the amount of turf he got.

The Justice said he believed the defendant got the amount of turf he contracted for and he would give a decree for £16, with 5/- expenses.
