At a meeting of the East Limerick Executive of the Irish Labour Party, held at Boher on Sunday, March 7th, Mr. Patrick Purcell, Bohermore, presided. MR. P. O'DEA, RATHKEALE.

The death of Mr. Patrick O'Dea, Lower Main Street, Rathkeale, which occurred unexpectedly on Wednesday, the 3rd inst., caused very sincere and general regret. A member of an old and highly respected Rathkeale family, the deceased was a man with a most lovable and gentle disposition who had a kindly word for everybody. As a conversationalist he could be most interesting, especially when either relating happenings in bygone times in Rathkeale or explaining some intricate mechanical problem in a manner that displayed rare ability. 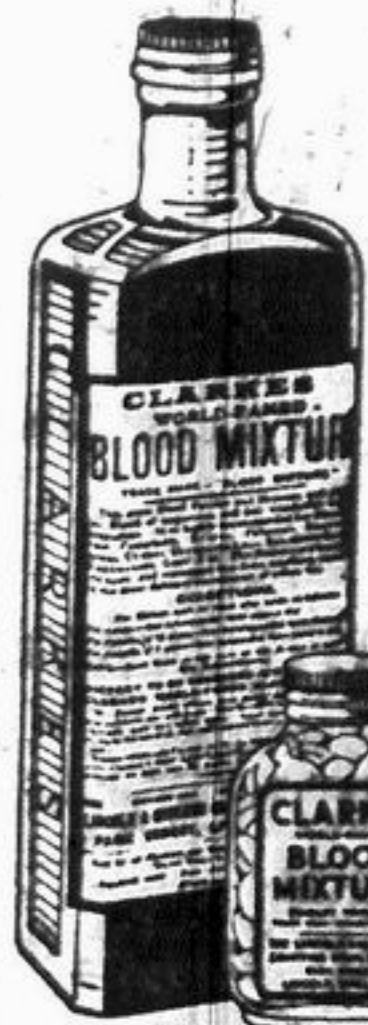
