WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET

Tuesday, March 9th—The entry for today's market was about the same in heifers as last week, but showed a decrease in cows. The attendance was most representative and buyers had a good number of high grade heifers to select from. The day was fine and bright, with a touch of spring sharpness, which gave the coats of the heifers with the term "feathers" an extra touch of good looks. Business dragged a bit at the beginning, as some vendors held for rates which buyers were not willing to give, but once the promising and choice heifers came into the ring there was a fine swing. Bids came freely and exchange was ready at full rates; many enquiries for the promising class, which drew sharp competition. It is gratifying to have so many dairy proprietors looking out for the best article, realising the value of breeding and type. An active demand for the "makings" of a true dairy cow, and more of this class could have been sold, as there were a number of buyers present wanting such. The thick, smaller heifer with promise met a steady selling trade; the average price for choice heifers was higher than previous markets; no difficulty in placing the right stamp. Mr. Patrick Buckley, Clounanna, Patrickswell, well deserved and topped the market at £39 for an outstanding roan heifer. Good demand for dairy cows and springers of the right sort. Mr. Michael Stritch, Clonlara, topped the market in this section at £36 15s. Substantial turnover, with a successful wind up and good clearance. Choice heifers, £32 to £39; promising, £28 to £31 10s.; ordinary, £19 10s. to £26 10s.; dairy cows, best, £30 to £36 15s.; ordinary, £19 to £24.—Wm. B. Fitt & Co., Auctioneers.

Small supply of strong stores, which were in keen request, and met a good selling trade at better rates. The turnout of young stores was the best for some weeks, and included a good number of drafts of well-bred feeders of the right stamp. In this department business was active, the tone of the market was even and steady; values showed an upward trend, and in favour of vendors. Choice yearlings sold well at best rates. All round a healthy tone and firm trend in prices; an almost complete clearance effected. Fat heifers and bullocks, £27 10s. to £35; fat cows, best, £29 to £38 10s.; second run, £21 to £27 15s.; backward, £11 10s. to £19; 3 year old bullocks, £27 10s.; 2 year old bullocks and heifers, best, £17 to £21; second run, £14 to £15 4s.; yearlings, best, £11 10s. to £14; second run, £9 2s. 6d. to £11. Sheep—Lighter entry, on the round class not up to this day week. Usual attendance of buyers, steady selling trade; well fed sheep in demand and easily cashed with competition. Good sheep are wanted. Best hoggets enquired for, and sold freely, full rates; secondary sorts slower. A steady selling trade for sheep fit for the "trade," no difficulty in cashing this class; full previous terms.
