It was burned by the Black-and-Tans, but was afterwards restored by a local man, who looked after it for the Pearse family. At present it is the property of Senator Miss Margaret Pearse and her sister, Miss M. B. Pearse.

At Roscommon County Committee of Agriculture, Mr. Charles T. O'Keeffe, secretary, exhibited a bronze medal won by Mr. Daniel Farrell, Beechwood, at a ploughing match held at Roscommon in 1843 under the auspices of the Roscommon Union Agricultural Society.
