MRS. HANLY, BALLINVIRA.

The death of Mrs. Michael Hanly, which occurred at her residence, Ballinvira, Croagh, early on Monday, 15th inst., occasioned deep and widespread regret. Daughter of the late Edward O'Connor, Knockdromin, Croagh, deceased belonged to a family held in the highest esteem in that parish. Naturally gentle and refined, and with a kindly and charitable outlook, she was a woman who had many fine traits of character. WAKE UP YOUR LIVER BILE

County Limerick Branch of the Irish Dairy Shorthorn Breeders' Society held their nineteenth annual show and sale at the Paddocks, Limerick, on Friday, under ideal weather conditions.

The total entry was slightly greater than last year but in the Aberdeen Angus class there was a decided fall, while the Hereford class also showed a slight decrease. There was an excellent entry in the shorthorn class, there being approximately thirty entries more than last year. Generally speaking, the quality of all the animals on show was excellent and the fact that approximately 43 premiums were awarded as compared with 31 last year is an indication of this.

Mr. Thos. H. Shine, Tuogh House, Adare, won the Dunraven Challenge Cup (for the best bull in the show); bred in County Limerick, whose dam and sire's dam have given over 8,000 lbs. of milk in 45 weeks, for the second year in succession with his entry Dairy Duke 3rd. Reserve, Mr. P. P. Keane, Kilmeeady.

The Boyd Cup, awarded for the best non-pedigree dairy shorthorn bull, in classes 2 to 7, was won by Mr. Patrick Mulqueen, Kiltenny Reserve, Mr. Thomas H. Shine, Adare, while the Hereford Medal, (awarded for the best pedigree Hereford bull in the show) was won by Rev. R. Bourke, P.P., O'Gonnolloe, Reserve, Mr. Michael Boland, Killaloe.

The Aberdeen-Angus Cup and medal for the best pure-bred Aberdeen-Angus bull in the show was won by Mr. T. H. Carry, Ballybritt House, Roscrea, Reserve, Mr. G. A. Harris, Limerick Junction.

Dance dress into pinafore frock

The difficulty with dance dresses is that they are usually cut on the cross and do not provide enough material to make a whole afternoon frock. The pattern is usually rather vivid, too.

But dress-designers have recently overcome this difficulty by creating the afternoon pinafore frock, made from flowered taffeta, crepe or satin, and worn over a dressy blouse of net or chiffon.

To make the pinafore frock, simply cut down the dance dress to day length. Then, use the most suitable part of the bodice top for the bib-front, with shoulder straps contrived from the cut-away hem of the skirt or other odd pieces.

You'll probably have a few small pieces of material left over and you can test one of these for washing. If the piece is all right, then it's safe to wash the frock. Use Lux, if you possibly can.
