FOUGHT IN EASTER RISING

The death occurred unexpectedly in Dublin on Wednesday of Mr. Sean Guilfoyle, who retired from the National Army in 1928 with the rank of Colonel, and who was well and popularly known in Limerick. The deceased for some years past—up to last Christmas, when he was transferred to Dublin—was a prominent member of the E.S.B. staff in Limerick and had won for himself the esteem, respect and confidence of the citizens as a whole. The late Mr. Guilfoyle, who was a Dublin man, joined the Volunteers in 1913, and during the 1916 Rising he fought in Boland's mill under Mr. de Valera. After the Treaty he joined the Free State Army and was Officer-in-Charge of Staff Duties from 1923 to 1924. He became a Colonel in the Quarter Master's General Staff in 1924, and subsequently he held the appointment of A.D.C. to the Governor-General until 1928, when he went on the reserve. From that date until the time of his death, he was an official of the E.S.B.

FAMOUS COMPOSER

One, who is described as "the friend and protector" of the Mozarts, died shortly after their return to their native town from travels in Italy and elsewhere.

His successor, who was not interested in art, refused to appoint the young composer to an office worthy of his talents. It is on record that he refused Mozart permission to leave Salzburg on a professional tour, and it is possible that on some other occasion he was kicked out, "literally," or otherwise; but there certainly was "friendship" with the other prelate, and I was justified in so stating.
