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businesslike lines. Investors in the  
cinema project will receive interest  
on their capital. Already people  
have sought shares, and the organ-  
isation has received promises of  
support from a number of firms  
and private individuals. The trav-  
elling talkie apparatus will be trans-  
ported in a gas-producer van. The  
first programmes will be shown in  
Tipperary. Following this initial  
try-out it is probable that Limerick  
County will be selected for the first  
part of the tour proper.

### THEIR OWN FILMS.

Even more ambitious is the  
second half of the idea, which pro-  
vides for the actual making of  
films. The organisers have pur-  
chased an expensive, up-to-date  
film camera of the silent type, and  
at present they are having an  
operator trained in Dublin in both  
projection and production work. In  
the course of touring they will  
thus be enabled to "take" films of  
many subjects of local and general  
interest, which will later form  
part of the programmes for subse-  
quent tours. It is hoped to set up  
a processing plant ultimately in  
Tipperary town. Their own films  
will naturally have special refer-  
ence to the work of the various  
Guilds strung up and down the  
country, but apart from this they  
will also be devoted to shots of  
places of architectural and arch-  
aeological interest, as well as  
factory life. The organisers have  
even toyed with the prospect of  
acquiring a complete sound-van,  
but under present conditions this  
appears to be beyond their reach.  
It will, however, be kept in mind.  
In fact, there is a hint in the air  
that should the present venture  
pan out as well as is expected  
Muintir na Tire may take the first  
steps in this country to establish a  
regular film industry.
