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preached an extravagant policy or condemned existing institutions. His own conviction was that their institutions were as sound as any to be found in Europe, but were badly in need of enthusiasm and life.

WHEN THE WAR IS OVER.

"Don't let us forget," said Mr. Meghan, "that at present we are very much sheltered by war restrictions from any brands of propaganda that will reach us in many ways when the war is over. We will not be able to stand against this unless our young people are trained and active propagandists for our own plan for a better world. That plan must be Catholic, but it must take account of the great industrial and economic difficulties that are to come. We cannot afford to neglect the study of all the aspects of our own problems, but each must do his own part in his own parish. If the parish is a solid unit, it will be able to weather any storms and depressions. From the parish unit, our own national genius can create a democratic government without the evils on one hand of a dictatorship, or on the other of a State Socialism." (applause).

Rev. C. Lee, C.C., D.D., said that one thing that damped the spirits of youth was that a great many of them felt that they had no prospects in their own country.

Rev. J. Bergin, C.C., also spoke. Very Rev. W. Fogarty, P.P., Ballylanders, presided.

Twenty enthusiastic members of the youth movement, which is an offset of Muintir na Tire, cycled from Hospital to Tipperary on Tuesday night to hear Mr. Meghan's Paper.

CO. LIMERICK LADY'S TRAGIC DEATH

While shopping in Charleville on Saturday last Mrs. Margaret Boyce (50), Ross Mills, Ballyagran, took suddenly ill, and died some hours later at the residence of friends in the town. SUGAR FOR JAM

Before Mr. C. S. Kenny, B.L., D.J., at Adare Court on Tuesday, John Young, Ballyvelogue, Patrickswell, was charged with making a false declaration when applying for a permit to purchase sugar to make jam.
