### WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, April 21st—Cattle—Exceptionally heavy entry, substantially more than last week; quite a useful show, and a better class.

more beef; prime heifers and bullocks in strong demand; with active enquiry and appreciable competition; also well done, fresh young cows met a firm demand, and ready exchange.

All round rates a turn dearer; market cleared.

Good enquiry for forward and promising feeders, this class met brisk trade at full current rates.

In young stores business was brisk, quality and condition commanded ready buyers, active enquiry, and sharp competition for top lots; previous full terms paid, no difficulty in cashing the right class; for small cattle and plain types demand was not as good.

Yearlings, a heavy entry; those with shapes and colour and condition freely bid for at steady rates.

A large and representative attendance of buyers, shipping interest well represented. Proceedings over the day were most satisfactory, with a substantial turnover and clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best £35 to £39; second run, £30 10s. to £33 15s.; fat cows, £29 10s. to £33; second run, £21 to £28 10s.; old, £12 10s. to £18 15s.; two year old bullocks and heifers, best £20 to £26; second run, £15 to £19 5s.; yearlings, best £12 10s. to £16 5s.; second run, £7 10s. to £12 10s.

Sheep—A very full entry again forward, about the same number as last week; fairly useful selection to draw from; more hoggets, big attendance.

Business opened on quiet lines, with a weaker tendency, rates moved on a somewhat lower basis. Well fed pens of wethers and hoggets were bid for, and nicely done sheep commanded attention, and sold readily; prime fat sheep a good selling trade.

Fresh ewes with quality found buyers.

Nice hoggets met a good trade, and changed hands readily.

All round prices showed an easier trend; last week's rates for best sheep maintained.

Business finished up fairly well with an exceptionally good clearance.

Market for Easter lambs, average entry choice, lambs in strong demand; smaller sorts also met steady trade and were readily placed.

### WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET

Tuesday, April 20th—Numerically the register of entries marked an increase on last week. There was not, however, an increase of choice lots, for this class there was evident and strong enquiry.

The attendance of buyers, which has been exceptionally good all along, included a number from a distance, and was one of the biggest of the season; generally speaking there were buyers for every class, and where some lots failed to change hands it was because vendors stood out for extra rates.

Business opened with a steady and active tone, buyers being willing to invest in the right article, and as there was a good number of promising buyers put due to confidence was quick and active on the firmest lines and continued steady throughout the day. All round prices on the higher level, and well maintained.

There was a steady demand for the high class heifers, and these fast spirited bidding lots without compensation for milk did not command them.

Heifers, but anything with the appearance of fair qualities had customers according to name. The right stamp of young cows, five or six years old, were in strong demand, and more could have been sold; secondary and older cows not in favour.

Trade worked out on most satisfactory lines; the turnover well up to last Tuesday; an exceptionally good clearance.

Mr. S. Campbell, Morelands, Clonlara, topped the market for meaty heifers, £35 to £41.
