WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, April 28th—Cattle—Full seasonable supply and a big muster of buyers. In the beef department an average entry, demand active and firm; anything with pretensions to condition readily bought up at top current values; fresh young cows of the better class came in for appreciable attention, and a free sale; older and secondary cows not in favour. Aged and forward cattle wanted, and continued to find ready customers. Choice and forward two-year-old polled bullocks met a strong demand, dearer rates; also useful grazing drafts wanted, and exchange easily effected. The nicer run of small cattle may be reckoned as making more money. Business for useful stock was buoyant and firm, with marked competition and steady selling trade; rates indicating a confirmation of recent improved position and stability in prices. Choice yearlings in brisk demand; rates on the higher level and well maintained. Firm selling trade throughout the day and a good sell up. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £33 to £36; second run, £25 to £29 15s.; fat cows, £27 5s. to £33; second run, £16 10s. to £21; two year old bullocks and heifers, best, £20 to £24 15s.; second run, £13 1s. to £18 17s. 6d.; yearlings, best, £11 15s. to £15 15s.; second run, £8 4s. to £11.
 Sheep—Numbers about the same as last week, an even and good show of mutton, all round a better quality. Best sheep made slightly more money than last market. Trade firm and steady for prime pens, which were freely bid for and easily placed. Choice hoggets active enquiry, sharp demand, steady rates. Young ewes a good trade. Forward store sheep cashed around previous level; no useful lots passed unless where owners stood out for extreme rates. Trade well supported, with an early finish and satisfactory clearance. Fat middle weight, 135/- to 152/-; second run, 126/- to 133/-; small, 105/- to 115/-; hoggets, best, 126/- to 144/-; second run, 110/- to 120/-; stores, 92/- to 104/-; second run, 68/- to 85/-; ewes, 95/- to 144/-—Wm. WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET

Tuesday, April 27th—The entries forward marked a slight decrease on last week, and from the standpoint of class and quality the show was not as good, and included quite a number of secondary heifers and cows; scarcity of high grade heifers. A representative attendance, a number wanting best heifers and cows. All round trade was hardly as active as last week, as buyers had not the same standard to select from, and were not willing to give last Tuesday's rates, which in most cases owners held out for; consequently trade had not the swing or activity of previous markets; this meant a cautious and stiffer exchange. There was, however, a steady demand for choice and promising heifers, and anything with pretensions to milk had plenty of buyers and attracted sharp competition. Fresh young cows came in for attention and drew a better trade than last week, the choicer animals found most favour. All round trade was not as active as recent markets, but best heifers and cows made recent current values. Satisfactory clearance. Top price for heifers went to Mr. R. Shanahan, Carheeney, Kildimo, at £38 10s. Best made £33 to £38 10s.; promising, £26 to £32 10s.; ordinary, £20 to £25 15s.; dairy cows, best, £26 to £31; ordinary, £19 10s. to £24 5s.—Wm. B.
