## GAELS AND GAMES GAA FOOTBALL

### Reminiscences.

In 1904 for the first time since 1897 the receipts of the Central Council amounted to over £10,000 and when all liabilities had been met there was a substantial sum on hand. In these receipts the states of the historic Kerry and Kildare matches in connection with the 1903 final were not, of course, included as the contests were not concluded until 1906 and addition there was the revenue of the Provincial Councils lately formed.

### Athletics.

Irishmen were responsible for some fine feats in athletics during the year, the most notable being when they defeated T. F. Kiely who was then Ireland champion of the world at the World's Fair in St. Louis in July.

Mention of Secretary O'Toole reminds me to refer to two great officials who directed the G.A.A. for over 20 years. I mean Ald. James Newlan, Killarney, and the chair, and Mr. Luke O'Toole Dublin, holding the pen. It was remarkable to see how these officials were elected to those responsible offices the same year.
