WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, May 12th—Cattle—A large supply again forward, although numbers were down to last week owing to the wet morning. Entry included a number of choice drafts, especially in the beef department. Good advance both shipping and home interests. We trade for prime fat bullocks and heifers, preference being for the latter; top rates were paid, last week's full prices easily attained. Nicely done fresh young cows inquired for and cashed at top rates; second-class cows also met a good demand and sale; a section of the market sold up early, sustained demand helped to keep up prices to the end, a complete clearance effected. Forward and aged cattle of the right stamp were well bid for, at a repetition of recent prices, and easily changed hands; shipping quotations gave energy and life to trade. Good drafts of stores enquired for and sold up at current values. Promising young calves in good demand, backward and second-class a bit tedious. Yearlings, a smaller supply. Choice yearlings met strong enquiry for useful bullocks and heifers got placed at current values. Mr. Luke McMahon, Ballymore, near Limerick, obtained £17 15s. for three very choice yearling heifers, bullocks and heifers, best, £33 10s. to £35 5s.; second run, £27 15s. to £32; small, £15s. to £27; fat cows, best, £35 10s. to £37 10s.; second run, £23 10s. to £29 10s.; old, £15s. to £21 5s.; two year old bullocks and heifers, best, £23 to £25 15s.; second run, £17s. 6d. to £18 10s.; backward, £12 10s. to £15 15s.; yearlings, best, £15 15s. to £18 15s.; second run, £11 8s. to £15 7s. 6d.; small, £8 8s. to £10 5s.

Full attendance of buyers; trade for prime wethers and hoggets brisk, with a free and quick demand for pens at late rates, and sales easily effected; suitable qualities of the right sort well sold.
