Dairy cows and incalf heifers—The entry
was one of the heaviest of the season and
included more good quality heifers than at
any of the previous sales this season; buyers
were in unusually strong attendance, and
bidding was brisk, especially for the good
promising heifers, practically all of which
were sold under the hammer. The number of
buyers present for heifers resulted in strong
bidding up to the end of the heavy entry.
Top price for heifers was obtained by Mr.
John Hannan, Corbally, at £33 15s., Mr. John
Boland, Kilbane, Broadford, being the runner-
up at £32 10s., and in the dairy cow depart-
ment Mr. C. McNamara, Singland, topped the
market at £30 10s. Incalf and calved heifers,
best, £31 10s. to £33 15s.; second run,
£27 10s. to £30 10s.; others, £21 to £26 5s.;
small, £16 to £19 5s.; incalf and calved dairy
cows, best, £27 10s. to £30 10s.; second run,
£21 to £26; others, £15 10s. to £19 10s.
Stores—The entry in this department was
heavy and mostly included young cattle,
buyers operating more freely than at previous
markets, resulting in a very big number of
lots being sold under the hammer, and in
spite of the fact that the entry was heavy,
and that it was late in the evening when
the last lots passed through the ring, buyers
were present right up to the end to pay full
current values, resulting in a substantial
turnover and a most satisfactory clearance.
