CLARE LIBRARY SERVICE

Replying to Mr. Falvey's last letter re above, Mr. A. D. Walters, O'Brien's Bridge, writes—I would ask can any librarian in Ireland give an accurate account of the number of persons who read a book once it leaves the shelves of a library for a fortnight. I live in a small village, had 150 borrowers on my books, but nearly 900 people had the pleasure of reading those books every week. When a book is taken into a house nearly every member of the family reads it if it is interesting, so it is highly ridiculous to think that Mr. Falvey, who was never associated with a library, can give facts. Ireland comes first in the world in the percentage of books read, having regard to the population. We have produced the best authors and the best books in the world, due to the literary ability of our people. We need not go to Dublin for books, we need not borrow English propaganda books, but we can get them from a service supported by the majority of the people. The Clare County Library has extended its service to our schools and convents to be read by the children, and so with the help of our learned teachers, dispel all illiteracy, which was so prevalent years ago. I hope the librarian will continue the good work. In conclusion, I may state that this controversy is now ended on my part, but I would like Mr. Falvey to read "Co. Ratepayer's" letter, which appeared in the "Leader" of the 8th May. It was a letter of sound commonsense, and I congratulate the writer.
