## DIED IN AUSTRALIA

An Australian reader sends us  
the following:—

It is with deep regret we learn  
of the death in far-off Australia of  
Mrs. Margaret Hogan (nee Noonan)  
on February 1st, at the residence  
of her son, Mr. Michael Alphonsus  
Hogan, of "Eire," Prince's High-  
way, Narre-Warren, Victoria, Aus-  
tralia, at the ripe age of 82 years.  
Mrs. Hogan was the beloved wife  
of the late Thomas Hogan, of  
"Rutland House," South Circular  
Road, Limerick, and will be well  
remembered by older residents, as  
up to her husband's death they  
carried on an extensive retail dair-  
ing business, supplying the city  
with milk. Mrs. Hogan was the  
youngest daughter of the late Mr.  
and Mrs. Jeremiah Noonan, of  
Toomaline, Doon, where to-day she  
must have many relatives. She  
leaves one son to mourn her loss.  
On her husband's death she went  
to London and later migrated with  
her son to Victoria, where she was  
engaged in the dairying industry.  
Her piety and gentleness endeared  
her to all and she was known as  
the "Little Irish Mother." She al-  
ways retained a passionate affec-  
tion for the land of her birth, and  
prior to the war was contemplating  
returning to her native land so as  
to be buried alongside her late hus-  
band at Donohill Cemetery. Her  
funeral was attended by a large  
following of friends. Her son, Mr.  
M. A. Hogan, would be glad to hear  
from any of his relatives in Doon  
or Limerick. Mrs. Hogan was the  
last of the Hogan and Noonan  
families, a brother having pre-de-  
ceased her in New Zealand a few  
years ago.
