It may be recalled that she presided at a huge meeting held in the old Theatre Royal in Henry Street on the 5th December, 1921, when **Mr. de Valera** was formally presented with the Freedom of Limerick, which honour was subsequently conferred on **Mrs. Tom Clarke** and **Professor Eoin MacNeill.**

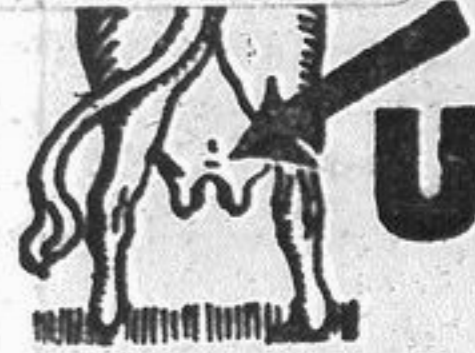
