their legal advisers. The Corporation had made a mistake and they had saved themselves from trying to stand over something that they had realised had been erroneous. Mr. Binchy said that he did not think that it would be desirable for him, now that the case had been settled, to go back on it, but he would like to say that if the City Manager had made a mistake it had been made in the stress of a trying situation where he must keep up the supply of gas to the citizens. The matter had had to be very carefully considered, and the City Manager had been acting in the best interests of everybody.

Mr. Justice Overend said that he was sure that the City Manager had acted in a way that he conceived to be in the discharge of his duties to the public, but when he saw that he had been technically wrong he thought that it was a very proper attitude for the Corporation to recognise that fact and save considerable expense by trying to stand over something which technically had been erroneous. He would make an order giving the declarations agreed on.

WIDOW FOUND DEAD

Mrs. Mary Moher, aged about 63, a widow living alone at a farmhouse at Knockcommane, Kilbehenny, County Limerick, on the borders of Cork, Limerick and Tipperary, was found dead in bed on Monday. The body, which bore several injuries, was found by Bartholomew Corbett, nephew of the dead woman's husband, who came to cut hay on the farm. An inquest was held subsequently by Dr. J. P. Cleary, coroner, Knocklong, and a jury and was adjourned on the application of Supt. Moore, Fermoy, who stated that a man had been detained in connection with the crime.

GLIN PARISH COUNCIL

At a meeting of the Glin Parish Council, the Secretary (Mr. Michael King, N.T.) said that he had a visit from a Departmental Inspector, who advised immediate spraying of the potato allotments. The Inspector expressed himself as pleased with the condition of the plots generally. It was decided to comply with the direction given.
