FELL INTO BOILING WATER

At Limerick Co. Infirmary on Tuesday afternoon, Mr. J. McNeice, solicitor, Deputy Coroner, held an inquest into the death of a child named Wm. Fitzgerald, son of Thomas Fitzgerald, stone-mason, Ballydoole, Kildimo, who died on 26th June, after falling into a pot of boiling water. Sergt. Farran, John Street, conducted the inquiry.

Dr. M. A. McMahon, Co. Infirmary, gave evidence of examining the body, and said that death was due to shock, following severe scalds.

Mary Fitzgerald, aunt of deceased, said the child was 3 years old, and had lived in her house since he was 9 months. On June 25th he was playing on the kitchen floor. Witness took a pot of boiling potatoes from the fire and placed it on the floor. While she was talking to her mother, they heard a cry, and on turning round saw that the deceased had fallen backwards into the pot. They immediately removed his clothes and treated him before taking him to Croom County Hospital. There were no beds available there, so they had to bring him to the Co. Infirmary.

The Coroner said the occurrence appeared to be a sheer accident, and returned a verdict accordingly. He expressed sympathy with deceased's parents.
