Wednesday, June 30th—Cattle—Entry a full seasonable supply, mixed character. Good attendance, both shipping and home interests. Shortage of beef and forward stores, enquired for and wanted. Brisk trade for handy weighted heifers and bullocks. Beef cows also found favour, and met a good sale; satisfactory terms; recent high rates well maintained. Choice and suitable young stores, both heifers and bullocks, enquired for and wanted; the right stamp of young feeders met a ready exchange with rates in favour of vendors. Business all round marked with much stability and brisk competition, dearer rates. Complete clearance almost effected. Fat heifers and bullocks, small, £20 to £28; Fat cows, best, £24 10s. to £30; second run, £14 to £22 10s.; two year old heifers and bullocks, £20 to £25; second run, £17 to £19 10s.; yearlings, best, £17 10s. to £19 15s.; second run, £10 5s. to £16 10s.
 Sheep—Smaller entry, but quite a number of choice pens, demand for which was brisk at slightly more money than last week; suitable selections, especially nice hoggets, met a free and quick demand at steady rates. Fresh young ewes a ready exchange. Fat lambs scarce; steady trade for suitable thick sorts. All round enquiry well sustained, with a healthy tone; good support for useful well fed sheep, buyers operating freely, which meant a quick clearance. Business wound up strong with a good sell up. Fat middle weight, 107/6 to 113/-; hoggets, best, 112/6 to 121/-; second run, 97/- to 111/-; ewes, 91/- to 102/-; lambs, best, 60/- to 81/-; second run, 49/- to 52/-—Wm. B.
