die down. Clematis is best let trail over a half dead tree or large bush, or over a trellis. It is more often seen on walls, which are often too hot for them, and their growth is too restricted. They like plenty of manure and lime in the soil. Clematis varieties are grafted to the root of wild clematis. "Old Man's Beard," seen growing wild on the roadside hedges. The grafted plants often fail after a year or two and the suckers from the wild rootstock grow away instead. I have heard a nurseryman say that if you want to grow 12 clematis you will have to plant 24.

A good way to propagate them is to layer a long young shoot after nicking it at several joints and covering these wounded areas with sandy soil to a depth of 2 inches. After rooting the rooted plants can be separated from the parent plant and planted out in new quarters.
