Application

A summons to construe the will of the late Robert F. Ryan, proprietor of the Glentworth Hotel, Limerick, came before Mr. Justice Overend in the High Court, Dublin, on Tuesday. It was brought by Mr. Ryan's son by his first marriage, Innocent Ryan, bank official, 6 Park Villas, Victoria Road, Cork, against Jack Fitzgerald, commercial traveller, Westcliffe Hotel, Kilkee, executor of the will, and Mrs. Kitty Ryan, Mr. Robert F. Ryan's widow. In his will, Mr. Ryan stated:—"I will devise and bequeath the Glentworth Hotel to my wife, to be managed by her as she shall think fit, and on no account shall she be interfered with by any member of my first family. The hotel shall be managed as aforesaid by my said wife for her own benefit and the benefit of my children in her absolute discretion by her until such time as my son, Michael, shall attain the age of 25 years, at which age I will devise and bequeath said hotel with the appurtenances in Catherine Street, annexed to my said son, Michael, absolutely, should he desire to carry on the hotel business, but in the event of his preferring to adopt a different mode of living, I devise and to him the sum of £1,000, charged on the Glentworth Hotel business, the rest of the interest in the hotel to fall into the residue of my estate. In the event of my wife marrying again, I desire that her interest in the hotel shall cease, and shall be charged with the payment to her for her life of a sum of £250 per annum."

The Court was asked to decide whether the widow had been constituted a trustee for herself and all her late husband's children of the profits of the hotel business carried on in the Glentworth Hotel under her management until Michael had attained the age of 25 years, and should the answer be in the affirmative, whether she and all the children would be entitled to equal shares of the profits during the period mentioned, and whether the profits should be properly devisable amongst her and all the children as she might in her discretion determine.

Mr. J. A. Costello, K.C., and Mr. Marnan (instructed by Messrs. Arthur Cox & Co.), appeared for Mr. Innocent Ryan, and Mr. Cecil Lavery, K.C., and Mr. W. O'B. Fitzgerald (instructed by Messrs. P. E. O'Donnell & Son), for Mr. Fitzgerald and Mrs. Kitty Ryan.

The late Mr. Ryan had, said Mr. Costello, been married twice. He had ten children by his first wife and three by his second, and this really was a dispute between the children of the first marriage and the children of the second; whether the children of the first marriage should get anything, and if so, how much; or whether the children of the second marriage should get everything. The estate was worth over £17,000.

Mr. Justice Overend said that he would hold that Mrs. Ryan had been placed by her husband in full control of the hotel and its management, with power to apply the proceeds for the benefit of herself or the children or any one or more of them of both families in any way that she thought fit.

Steady enquiry for strong cattle, forward lots and promising feeders; this class met brisk trade at full current rates. In young stores business was exceptionally brisk, quality and condition commanded ready buyers. Active enquiry and sharp competition for choice bullocks and heifers; previous full terms freely paid, no difficulty in cashing the right class. Trade all round worked out on similar lines to last week. The market closed with a strong and satisfactory finish, a heavy volume of business transacted, and practical clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, 22s to 23s 10s; small, 22s 10s. to 22s; fat cows, 17 10s. to 22s; two year old bullocks and heifers, 20 5s. to 22 10s.; yearling heifers, best, 18 7s. to 21 10s.; second run, 13 to 18 2s. 6d.; bullocks, 15 10s. to 18 7s. 6d.; second run, 11 to 15.
