Dear Sir—Please permit me, through the medium of your widely read paper, to refer to a little incident which occurred at the public meeting held recently at Geary's Hotel under the auspices of the Limerick Association Football Club.

At this meeting the name of David Walsh, the club's late centre forward, was raised and reference made to the losing of this player for the coming season. Emphasis was stressed that I was actually responsible for the loss of this brilliant player, which, of course, is contrary to facts well known to the Management Committee; but because I did not choose to let the matter go unchallenged at this meeting it now transpires that a mis-statement of the facts has been conveyed to David Walsh, who, naturally so, has been rather annoyed at the fact that his name was made the subject of a controversy at this meeting.

I am deeply indebted to David Walsh for calling on me yesterday and allowing me to peruse a letter which he had received, giving him a version of what had transpired.

I will not waste your time and valuable space in dwelling on the statement, only to say that the position has been clarified as far as David Walsh and myself are concerned, and I have expressed my regrets to him for having been a party to the argument which caused his name to be so prominently pronounced at this meeting, but those who profess such concern for this player would have better served him had the matter been left where it started.

It is now hoped that the incident will not mar the negotiations at present proceeding between officials of the club and this player for his return to once again lead the Limerick team in the coming season.

In passing, may I mention that David Walsh has stated that he has never at any time, when visiting my house, received anything but the greatest of courtesy from all members of the family, including yours truly.

previous year. The measures which have been taken during the past few years are slowly proving effective in the improvement of the salmon fisheries. There was an increase in the run of spring salmon. The spawning season this year was good; the number of salmon observed in the redds in Castleconnell was much higher than in any previous season since the hydro-electric development of the Shannon. Nearly 27 tons of eels were taken, an improvement of eight tons over the previous season. The eels realised the highest price in the London market, and the revenue obtained from them was double the amount the year before. This year it was decided to close down the oyster plant for the duration of the emergency, as it was not found economic to operate it in view of the limited stock of oysters on the beds. The feasibility of undertaking the breeding of oysters in tanks is under investigation.
