FARMERS AND PURCHASE OF FERTILISERS

The Department of Agriculture desires to warn farmers and retail distributors of artificial fertilisers as to the need for exercising care in the purchase of materials advertised or represented to contain high fertilising values. On analysis at State Laboratory some of these materials have been found to contain less than 25 per cent. total phosphate, no water-soluble phosphates and less than 1 per cent. citric soluble phosphate. Farmers cannot, therefore, be recommended to use such materials (irrespective of the attractive trade names under which they are offered for sale) as substitutes for phosphatic manures which farmers have been accustomed to use.

The advice and assistance of the Department's local officers in regard to any particular fertilising material are at the farmers'

disposal.

MONEY IN FLAX

Four Irish Counties—Monaghan, Cavan, Donegal and Cork—will benefit this year to the extent of £1,250,000 from the growing of flax, Steps are being taken to extend flax growing in many parts of the country. Grants are being given for the erection of new scutching mills and the repair of old ones.

The tillage area in Co. Limerick last year was 69,693 statute acres as against 41,728 statute acres in 1940. The wheat acreage jumped from 8,159 acres in 1940 to 19,373 acres in 1942 while the area under potatoes advanced from 10,494 acres to 14,065. During the present year, of course, the tillage area in the county has been still further extended.
