DEATH OF REV. J. KELLY, P.P.

It is with very deep regret that we chronicle the demise of Rev. John J. Kelly, P.P., Templeglantine, one of the most beloved priests in the Diocese of Limerick. He was in his 73rd year. The deceased priest was a class-mate in Rome, where he was ordained in 1895, of the late Most Rev. Dr. Byrne, Archbishop of Dublin. He was a member of the original Coiste Gnotha of the Gaelic League and was a brilliant Irish scholar. He took a prominent part in the independence movement and presided at an historio meeting in Newcastle West of Irish Volunteers, addressed by Sean MacDermott on St. Patrick's Day, 1915. During the conscription crisis in 1918 he spoke at a huge gathering in the Square, Newcastle West, and newspapers which published his speech were promptly suppressed. He was for many years curate in Newcastle West and he was beloved by the poor, particularly in the many parishes in which he ministered—Rathkeale, Monagea, Newcastle West Templegiantine. For many years he' was a member of the professorial staff of St. Munchin's College, and having laboured in the parishes named as curate, he was appointed to the pastoral charge of Templeglantine in 1924. His death will occasion widespread regret and sorrow.
