It can truly be said, for instance, that it was to no small extent responsible for securing the degree of nattional freedom we now enjoy. The cause of Irish Ireland in general, however, still needs a great deal of pushing, and there is urgent need for inculcating amongst our people a stronger idea of national distinctiveness.
