### KILKEE CUP

The Kilkee Cup golf final was played at Kilkee on Sunday, 25th July, between T. J. Corboy (14), of Limerick, and P. C. McMahon (9), of Ennis. A feature of the great struggle (writes a correspondent) was the colossal driving by McMahon, which evoked gasps from the numerous "gallery." This did not, however, daunt Corboy, who played his usual game of "short, straight and always on the fairway." He was dormy 3 when McMahon sank a 10 feet putt to give himself a further reprieve. This caused the spectators to think that McMahon intended to snatch victory from the jaws of defeat, as he had done last year when he won five holes in succession to gain the trophy. On the 16th and vital hole McMahon had a 9 inches putt for a win but failed to sink it, which just goes to prove what kind of a "game" golf is. Had he sunk this, in all probability the match would have gone to the 22nd and furnished a most thrilling finish. But the game now ended with a victory for Corboy of 3 and 2.

A special word of praise is due to the Limerick schoolboy, John Holmes, who beat many doughty golfers and brought Tom Corboy to the 21st hole in the semi-final.

A very successful auction and sweep was held in connection with the competition, when Mr. Corboy showed that he hadn't very much to learn in the gentle art of auctioneering.

In a few happy remarks on the presentation of the cup by the captain (Mr. H. Culhane), Mr. Corboy said that now he was in the position that he could retaliate when Mrs. Corboy boasted of her winning of the cup some years ago.

The annual Golf Dance, held in the Royal Marine Hotel after the final, was patronised by 200 couples and "a good time was had by one and all" until the last dance at 3 a.m.
