just not wearing them, is favoured and approved nowadays to a much greater extent than ever before. Remember, though, the risk of the stockingless feet becoming sore and blistered. The immediate treatment of sore heels with soothing liniments must not be neglected.

A bigger size of shoe many be needed in summer than in winter. It is always best to try on new shoes in the latter part of the day, for then the feet are at their maximum size. Activity in warm weather enlarges them or makes parts of the feet swollen.

Many people suffer from perspiring feet in the summer. For this very real trouble the best advice is to change the stockings frequently, as moist perspiration is a prime cause of blisters. A blister should be pierced with a needle dipped in iodine; after pricking, or, rather, passing the needle through, squeeze the fluid out gently, then cover the area with clean lint. Failing immersion in iodine, the needle should be boiled.

Bathing the feet with salt or vinegar in water is a tonic and also helps to check perspiration, and rubbing over with vinegar or an alum block helps when bathing is inconvenient.

JUST TO REMIND YOU.

Burnt marks on plates can be treated successfully with a cork and a little damp salt. Rust spots on metal may be removed if they are rubbed with a cork that has been dipped in paraffin. A cork moistened with paraffin is also splendid for removing marks from hearth tiles.

Spots on linoleum may be treated with a cork which is repeatedly dipped in benzine or an equivalent proprietary substitute. Blemishes on window panes may be removed with a dry cork. Of course, if the spots are actually in the glass, they will not disappear, but many marks which have defied ordinary cleaning will yield to rubbing with a cork.
