# DEATH OF SIR CHARLES. BARRINGTON

The death of Sir Charles Barrington, Bart., formerly of Glenstal Castle, which took place on Saturday in Botley, Hampshire, at the advanced age of 95 years, was learned of with deep rerget in Limerick. He was eldest son of Sir Croker Barrington, and on the death of his father he succeeded to, the ancestral home and estate. He continued to reside at Glenstal until 1923, when he and Lady Barrington (who died recently) went to live in England. Before leaving he offered the Castle and demesne lands to the Irish Government as an official residence, but the gift was declined owing to the cost of upk up. He then sold the proporty to the late Right Rev. Monsignor Ryan, Thurles, who presented it to the Belgian Benedictine Fathers.

Sir Charles, who celebrated his 95th birthday last February, was a Deputy Lieutenant of the County and Justice of the Peace, and life Governor and joint Hon. Secretary of Barrington's Hospital, in which he evinced an abiding interest Its welfare throughout his life. was a prime concern, and the link that bound him to Limerick during the years that have elapsed since he disposed of his ancestral seat. He was one of the best landlords and always considerate for his tenantry, and immensely popullar with the people of Murroe and

Educated at Trinity Contact Sing Charles was a prominent that sman in his student days, and had the distinction, it is said, of introducing Rugby football to Ireland. He was the first President of the Limerick Amateur Athletic Bicycle Club. He is succeeded in the Barsonetcy by his elder son, who resides in London.
