GARDENING

Seasonal Hints

It is time now to get the rooted strawberry runners planted into their permanent quarters. Plant them carefully and no deeper than they were while rooting. Firm each plant in with the hands and water if the soil is dry. Plant them 9 inches to 1 foot apart in the row, leaving at least two feet between each line. The old plantation shoud be now clean. If not, cut back most of the foliage and all the runners, hoe and leave the plot clean. A top-dressing of decayed manure would be advantageous, as the rooting system for next year's crop is made now. Incidentally, while hoeing see that the soil is brought up to and not away from the crowns.

Cut away most of the old wood in Morello cherries and tie in this

year's growth.

August used to be the month for sowing onions, and if home-grown seed of Tripoli, Solidity, White Lisbon, Reliance, of James's Keeping can be had sow it between now and the end of the month. If American seeds are sown now they will boit in spring; therefore, delay the sowing of these until the first or second week in September. In the meantime, the seed beds could be made ready.
