

**GARDENING**

**Seasonal Hints**

It is time now to get the rooted strawberry runners planted into their permanent quarters. Plant them carefully and no deeper than they were while rooting. Firm each plant in with the hands and water if the soil is dry. Plant them 9 inches to 1 foot apart in the row, leaving at least two feet between each line. The old plantation should be now clean. If not, cut back most of the foliage and all the runners, hoe and leave the plot clean. A top-dressing of decayed manure would be advantageous, as the rooting system for next year's crop is made now. Incidentally, while hoeing see that the soil is brought up to and not away from the crowns.

Cut away most of the old wood in Morello cherries and tie in this year's growth.

August used to be the month for sowing onions, and if home-grown seed of Tripoli, Solidity, White Lisbon, Reliance, of James's Keeping can be had sow it between now and the end of the month. If American seeds are sown now they will bolt in spring; therefore, delay the sowing of these until the first or second week in September. In the meantime, the seed beds could be made ready. The ground after potatoes would make a good site. If the soil is poor, dig in some well-decayed farmyard manure and leave the soil rough on the surface until the time of sowing, when it can be trdden or rolled down and raked off to make it fine. Prepare, if possible, a site that can be covered with frame lights to keep the soil dry for this late sowing. Cauliflowers, too, for early summer cutting should be sown in the open before the end of the month and wintered in cold frames. Some varieties are better than others for this purpose. Early Earfort, Harbinger, and Snow Queen are three good varieties.

As fruit for jam-making is scarce, the rhubarb will be still in demand. Be careful not to over-tax the stools by using it too much. If this is done the crowns will be very weak next year. As soon as the leaves begin to die down give the plot a good mulch of farmyard manure and dig it in during late autumn or early winter when the stools are still visible. Transplant July sown lettuce and put some in frames for winter use.

Keep the hoe going on every possible occasion, especially among autumn-grown crops.

Look out for good specimens of flowers, fruit and vegetables and give them extra attention if they are to be exhibited at the Show next week.
