

...the other end they  
went wide more than once and a  
mistake that was pretty freely com-  
mented on was that of "picking"  
which failed time and again. This  
is not to say that the visitors had  
it all their own way, for it was  
only by the application of all their  
skill and force that they succeeded  
in breaking the great defence put  
up by the Kilmallock team. Hurling  
to the last limit of attack there  
was an assault on the Croom post  
which almost baffles description,  
but which lifted depression at the  
Kilmallock side when a well fought  
for goal was registred. It was a  
game towards the closing stages  
in which close marking was not  
in evidence and there was a con-  
siderable share of loose play. Croom  
continued to improve their position  
and at half time whistle the score  
was Croom, 3-3; Kilmallock, 1-0.

Croom started off against a  
strong wind and tried hard for a  
score, but went wide. There was a  
mixture of rough and scattered  
play and some of the players were  
particularly hot and were danger-  
ously near the line as regards in-  
fringements of the rules. The  
Kilmallock goal had two very close  
shaves and a really clever and  
brave defence was put up before  
the ball was cleared out, when the  
visiting team had to go on the de-  
fence and had to concede a point.  
After the puck out Croom were  
again pressed and the ball was shot  
to the net but ere it reached it the  
whistle had gone for a foul and no  
score was given. Scores were ex-  
changed but the balance lay with  
the Croom side, who had two  
further goals, while a major was  
denied to the Kilmallock forwards  
by an almost impenetrable full  
back line and they had to content  
themselves with three further  
points and Croom put in a last  
minute minor.
