**Mr. P. Walsh**, who refereed the junior football match between South Liberties and Pallasgreen, played at Caherconlish on August 22nd, in the course of his report stated that the game was played in a good sporting spirit, except for an incident nearing the end, when opposing players came to grips, and spectators rushed in and took part. "I had considerable difficulty in clearing the pitch," he added, "and all through the game people on the side-line were encroaching on the playing pitch."

**The Chairman** remarked that the referee did not say which side was responsible for their followers encroaching on the pitch.

**Mr. Walsh**, who was present at the meeting, said that all the teams' followers were strangers to him and it was, therefore, impossible to place the blame on any particular side.

**Mr. M. Kelly** said that four of the South Liberties players were injured in the incident and some of the players bicycles were punctured.

**The Chairman** said he was afraid the Board would have to suspend both teams.

**Mr. P. O'Reilly** remarked that South Liberties were always a law-abiding team.

**Mr. Walsh** expressed the opinion that the teams were not to blame and he suggested that the game be re-played.

**The Chairman** said that according to rules the teams were responsible for the actions of their followers.

**Mr. Walsh** said it was only fair to inform the Board that when he gave the two captains two minutes to clear the pitch they did so without delay.

**Mr. O'Reilly** said that in a field where there was no enclosure it was very difficult to prevent spectators from encroaching. People often got excited over a small thing and went in on the pitch.

**Chairman**—People are often suspended for getting excited.

"If we were all suspended for getting excited I am afraid there would not be many of us here today," remarked **Mr. P. Fitzgerald**, amidst laughter.

In reply to the **Chairman**, the referee admitted he saw a spectator striking a player during the incident. He did not know to which side the spectator belonged.

**Mr. P. O'Shaughnessy** proposed and **Mr. O'Reilly** seconded, that the match be re-played, and as this appeared to be the general feeling, the **Chairman** said he would accept the proposition. He added that if there was ever a report before the Board in which it was stated that a spectator struck a player the presumption would be that the spectator was a follower of the opposing team, which team would lose the match as a result of his action.
