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### FOUND BROTHER DEAD

The sudden death of Mr. Wm. Madden, Dunvullen, Caherline, an employee of the Caherconlish Co-Operative Creamery, created a profound shock in the district, writes our correspondent. In his early thirties, he attended the Gaelic matches in Caherconlish on Sunday, when he appeared to be in the best of health and spirits. He retired to bed at his usual hour, and on Monday morning, when his sister entered his room to call him, she was horror-stricken to find that he had died during the night.
