DIED IN HARNESS!

John Griffin, Ahaclare, described as a dealer in fowl, was summoned to Broadford Court on Thursday last to answer a charge of having, on 21st July, allowed a horse to wander on the public road at Woodfield and of having, on 23rd July, worked the same horse whilst it was in an unfit state.

Guard Ambrose O'Rourke, who proved both offences, said the horse had a sore on its back, which was coming in contact with the straddle and was very bad. The horse seemed to him to be dying at the time and he told Griffin to take it from under the cart. Griffin did not seem inclined to do so. Witness understood that the horse had since died.

The defendant said he had kept the horse idle for six weeks on account of its having a warble on its back. He agreed that the horse was dying on the 23rd July and had since died.

In reply to Mr. D. F. Gleeson, D.J., the Guard said the defendant was a poor man, who had not been long in the district, and the death of the horse was a big loss to him. In the circumstances, the Justice said he would impose a fine of 5/-.

FERGUS DRAINAGE WORKS

Some 65 men, in three gangs, are now engaged at 36/- a week each on the improvement works in the Fergus Drainage District—mainly in the Ennis and Clarecastle area. At Doora, whilst one gang is raising and strengthening the existing river embankment, another is working in conjunction with an excavator which is removing in scoops, taking 10 or 12 cwt. at a time, earth from a slope in a field opposite Mr. O'Loughlin's. This earth is stated to be of a kind specially suitable for the toe of the new embankment to be run along the roadside from the Metal Bridge. The right to remove it has been acquired by the Office of Public Works from the owner of the field, which will be re-surfaced when the works are completed. The number of men employed is increasing week by week, and, in the course of the next few months, it is expected that all the available workers in the district will be absorbed.

STOLE PRIEST'S BICYCLE

At Kilkee District Court, before Mr. D. F. Gleeson, D.J., Michael O'Connor, Donoughboy, Kilkee, pleaded guilty to the larceny of a Raleigh bicycle, the property of a Limerick priest.

According to Supt. Dawson, who prosecuted, the defendant made a statement, in which he admitted taking the bicycle. The statement was to the effect that the defendant went to the West End at 11 o'clock at night on August 28th, and, seeing a bicycle on the green lawn in front of Westcliff Hotel, took it away with him. He then went to Patrick McInerney's, of Kilfearagh, where there was a "wake," but only remained a few minutes, and went home and put the bicycle in a cabin.
