The 200 Yards Championship of Limerick, postponed from previous galas, was decided at the Baths last evening. Three entrants took the plunge—H. Daly (Blue Star), P. Greene, and J. Butler (Thomond). The course was across the river and back. In the first leg of the race Paddy Greene took the lead, with Daly and Butler close on his heels. On the return trip Greene held on to his slight lead for about three-quarters of the way, but Daly, with a strong burst, came home first about fifteen yards in front of his rivals. Butler was placed second. Greene came home before the latter but swam outside the course. Mr. J. O'Donovan, starter and judge, presented the cup and medals, and congratulated the victor and the other two hardy swimmers for their splendid achievements both in this event and at the galas throughout the season.

SERVED HIS COUNTRY WELL

The death has occurred of Mr. Philip McMahon, Killaloe, a veteran of the 1916 movement. Philip was a great favourite with everyone in Killaloe and his death has occasioned widespread regret and sorrow. In 1916 his father, a Head Constable, was serving in Killaloe, whilst his son, the deceased, was an active Volunteer under the late Thomas Ashe. With Ashe, he was arrested and sentenced to a long term of imprisonment. In 1917 he worked on behalf of Mr. de Valera and secured many Sinn Fein votes in the Killaloe area. He was an ardent Gael. To his sorrowing brothers and sisters the greatest sympathy is extended.
