### A LEAN SEASON

Derryeastle, the highlands and lowlands of Ogonnelloe, and the heights of Lackereigh and Ballykildea, once noted resorts of the grouse and wild duck, appear to have been deserted by most of their feathered denizens (writes our Killaloe correspondent). The grouse shooting season in the Killaloe area was not a success, due not to the want of ammunition, but to the scarcity of birds.

### HAD AN ILLICIT STILL.

Patrick Reihill, farmer, Greagh-cashel, Lisnaskea, was yesterday, at Lisnakea Petty Sessions, sentenced to three months imprisonment, with hard labour, and fined £10, for having had an illicit still in his possession. Constantine Murphy, Eshbrally, Lisnakea, was fined £10 for being found on Reihill's premises.

### EXCESS PRICES FOR TEA AND BUTTER.

James Geraghty, Monalty, was fined a total of £13 10s., with £1 7s. 6d. costs and expenses, at Kelis Court, in a series of summonses for selling tea and butter at an excess price, and failing to keep a proper record of tea sales.

### MILLED WHEAT WITHOUT LICENCE

For milling wheat by way of trade without the necessary licence, Patrick McNally, Naul Hill, Naul Co. Dublin, was fined £2, with £1 11s. 6d. costs, at Balbriggan District Court.

### A WIN FOR OGONNELLOE

Ogonnelloe junior "A" team again defeated Mountshannon at Tulla on Sunday last. There was no doubt about the superiority of the Ogonnelloe players. They were by far the better trained team.

### FATALLY INJURED BY COW

Thomas Moore (70), Grange, Kilmore, Co. Wexford, sustained fatal injuries when attacked by a cow, which knocked him down and trampled upon him.

Sergeant Kelly said he visited the premises on the date in question at 10.58 p.m. and found three non-bona-fide travellers in a shed in the yard.

Defendant was fined 40/-, and the men found on the premises 2/6 each.

Maurice Griffin, Ballydwane, Clarina, was summoned for having an unlicensed bull in his possession.

After hearing the evidence, the Justice imposed a fine of 20/-, with 15/- expenses.

Thomas P. Meaney, Mungret, was charged with over-charging for flake oatmeal.

Mr. T. E. F. Bennett, solr., prosecuted on behalf of the State Solicitor, and Mr. P. G. Collins, solr., defended.

Mr. Bennett said that on the 7th April, 1943, Garda O'Connor, as Food and Drugs Inspector, went to defendant's premises and purchased a sample of flake oatmeal, and for which he paid 6d. The quantity purchased was 1 lb., which was at the rate of 7/- per stone. The fixed minimum price at the time was 5/4 per stone.

Complainant, in reply to Mr. Collins, said that if defendant swore he told him he did not know what the price was he would not contradict him. Witness denied that he suggested to defendant that the price should be 6d. for the lb.

Defendant, in evidence, said that when it came to the discussing of the price of the meal witness told the Guard he did not know the price of the 1 lb. of meal, and the Guard suggested 6d., and witness accepted that amount.

Mr. Bennett said there was no deliberate attempt to defeat the law, but he asked the Justice to impose a fine.

Defendant was fined 2/6.

In a case in which William Allen, Graigue, Adare, summoned Joseph Alfred, same place, for assault and abusive and threatening language,

The Justice, after hearing the evidence, fined defendant 5/-, with 10/- costs, on the assault summons.

Mr. N. S. Gaffney, solr., appeared for complainant.
