### WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, Sept. 22nd—Cattle—Numbers on sale not up to last week, but more than seasonable supply, and a good show. Strong attendance, both home and shipping interests. Beef in fair numbers; active trade, especially for prime heifers. Rates well up to current values. Young fresh cows are finding favour, and were readily cashed; secondary and older sorts also changed hands, complete clearance in this section. Some useful drafts of feeders. In store department well-bred useful bullocks with condition found ready purchasers. In the younger section choice bullocks and heifers showing condition and quality in demand, especially cross-bred Hereford bullocks; smaller sorts not quite so active, plain and thin stores difficult to negotiate. All round enquiry not as firm as recent markets, and value position somewhat easier. The day wound up with a good finish and clearance. Fat heifers and bullocks, £29 10s. to £35 5s.; second run, £24 to £29 5s.; fat cows, £23 10s. to £28 10s.; second run, £19 5s. to £23; old, £13 10s. to £17 5s.; two and a half year old bullocks, £25 12s. 6d. to £28 15s.; second run, £18 10s. to £21; one and a half year old bullocks, best, £16 10s. to £21; second run, £12 10s. to £15 10s.; heifers, £18 to £21; second run, £12 15s. to £16 5s.

Sheep—A very full supply, all pens filled, the turnout a useful character. Big attendance of buyers. Trade opened rather quietly, as some vendors were not willing to accept current rates, but soon settled down, and worked out smoothly; buyers operated freely. Rates well up to the basis of this day week. Choice wethers enquired for, in demand and cashed; well fed sheep met a ready exchange. Young ewes a good trade. Store sheep cashed around previous level. Fat lambs freely bid for at current rates. Buyers for useful store lambs, which were in good demand and sold well. Trade well supported, with an early finish and satisfactory clearance. ### WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, Sept. 21st—The entry for to-day's market was about the same as last week, a seasonable supply. The cows and heifers on offer, with a few exceptions, were in the whole an excellent class, and buyers in request of high grade cows were not disappointed. The attendance was large and most representative, including some buyers from a long distance; a number wanting choice dairy cows. Business was quick and active, on the firmest lines, and continued steady throughout the market. Fresh young cows came in for special attention, and drew ready competition. All round advanced rates, the most promising lots met spirited bidding, and touched the highest level in prices for the autumn season; more choice cows and heifers could have been sold, as there was an exceptionally strong demand for the high class; secondary cows and heifers also came in for attention, and anything with the appearance of dairy qualities had customers. Trade worked out on most satisfactory lines, the market being practically sold up. An outstanding dairy cow, the property of Mr. James Hourigan, College Tipperary, realised the record price for this season of £50, the purchaser being Mr. G. E. Glynn, Kilrush, the runner-up being Mr. Jno. Hannan, Corbally, at £48, also purchased by Mr. Glynn. Choice dairy cows, £45 to £50; promising, £34 to £41 10s.; ordinary, £24 15s. to £33 10s.; incalf heifers, promising, £30 to £33 10s.; ordinary, £25 to £29 10s.—Wm. B. Fitt and Co., Auctioneers.
