extension. During the past twenty years, from time to time, various moves were made to extend the city boundary, but all these attempts failed because of the resolute opposition of the Co. Council. Any encroachment on county territiony would affect the raffe rievenue of the Co. Council. would be a very serious matter for the county ratepayers as a whole. He did not want to appear as distrusting the proposal of the Corporation in the present stance, but they had to take into account moves made in the past to extend the boundary.

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It was accordingly decided to adjourn further consideration of the

letter to the next meeting.
