## ALLIES ENTER NAPLES

According to messages received this evening the 5th Army is make ing good progress towards Naples, which is reported to be in a mass of flames.

The Allied communique to-day announced that Avellance 30 miles west of Naples, has been taken.

A later message states that the 5th Army has entered Naples.

Earlier in the day Cairo Radio had reported the occupation Terre-Annunciata, 12 miles south of Naples.

Messages received from Moscow in connection with the great battle of the Dnieper state that the German Command is throwing in reserves of tanks and infantry in a shop bid to slow down the Soviet advance.

On the White Russian front Soviet troops are less than twelve miles north-east of Orsha and 25 miles from Mogilev. Further south they are less than 30 miles from Vitabsk.
