

OBITUARY

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MR. J. McDONNELL

It is with the deepest regret that we announce the death of Mr. Jack McDonnell, who passed away rather unexpectedly at his residence, 71 Lansdowne Park, on Tuesday last. The deceased was well known and deservedly popular among a large circle of friends and acquaintances. He was the youngest son of Mrs. and the late Thomas McDonnell, Superintendent, National Assurance Co. He was deeply interested in several spheres of sport, particularly cricket and table tennis. In the latter form of amusement he was champion of Limerick last season and represented the Catholic Institute Athletic Club in both. He was also writer of the Cricket Notes which appeared in these columns for some years past. The death of his father some months ago has added poignancy to the sad event. To his mother, brothers and relatives we extend our sincerest sympathy.

Amidst general manifestations of sorrow, the remains were removed to St. Munchin's Church on Wednesday evening. Requiem Mass was celebrated for the repose of his soul yesterday morning, and the funeral took place at 3 o'clock to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery. The cortege was so large and representative that it would be impossible to give anything like a list of names of those who attended.

WITH THE ARMY

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7TH BRIGADE'S FOUR CHAMPIONSHIPS

Last Sunday saw the 7th Brigade again victors, when they defeated the 6th Brigade in the final of the All-Army hurling championship at the Army Grounds, Phoenix Park.

The 6th Brigade struggled valiantly to hold the 7th to a half-time score of 2-1 to 0-2, but they faded out in the second half against the brilliant hurling of Cpl. Mick Mackey and the forward line, Cpl. Tobin, Pte. O'Reilly and Pte. O'Riordan. Comdt. Cooney, at centre half back, played an outstanding game, as did the rest of the back line, as was proved by the fact that the scores from the 6th Brigade were mostly from frees. For the 6th Brigade Lieut. Rhenisch and Pte. Baggot did well around centre-field.

Scorers for the 7th were Cpl. Tobin (2 goals 3 points), Pte. O'Riordan (3 goals), Cpl. Mackey (4 points), Pte. O'Reilly (1 goal 2 points), Comdt. Cooney (point), Pte. O'Sullivan (point). For the 6th Brigade, Ptes. Baggott (5 points), and Bellew and Quigley a point each. This left the final score—6-11 to 0-7.

To reach the All-Army final the 7th Brigade defeated the Southern Command, 3rd Brigade and the 1st Brigade. Two matches were played to decide who would be the Southern finalists. In the first match, both of which were held in Tipperary, the 1st Brigade were leading by a score of nineteen points at half-time but the 7th rallied to bring the final scores level at 7-6 to 6-9. In the replay the 7th won by a comfortable margin. The captain of the hurling team, Cpl. Mick Mackey, now adds an All-Army medal to his collection.
