WEEKLY CATTLE AND SHEEP MARKET.

Wednesday, November 3rd—Cattle—Increased numbers on last week; fairly good entry of beef, which was freely bid for; active demand; late rates easily obtainable. Fresh heiferish cows negotiated; older and secondary sorts met a dull and slow trade. In aged store cattle section business was irregular and weaker; heifers cashed readier than bullocks. Young, well-bred stores of the right stamp changed hands on the lower basis of rates, and vendors willing to take current values got out fairly satisfactorily; rough and plain sorts not in favour. The aspect of the market in this section was somewhat brighter than last week. Heifer calves top rates. Market fairly well cleared. Strong and representative attendance of buyers. Fat heifers and bullocks, best, £29 to £33 15s.; second run, £24 to £27 10s. Fat cows, ordinary, £19 to £22 15s.; old, £12 15s. to £17; 2 1/2 year-old heifers and bullocks, £19 15s. to £24; second run, £15 15s. to £17 5s.; 1 1/2 year-old bullocks and heifers, £16 5s. to £18; second run, £11 5s. to £15 10s.; calves, £10 to £10 7s. 6d. Sheep—Number showed a decrease, but full seasonable entry; the turnout of good sheep less than last week. Trade firm and active for well fed sheep, and top prices of last day readily repeated; all round steady trade for pens fit for the trade. Enquiry for feeding sheep and lambs is easing off with the advancing season, and useful well-bred stores had buyers on the lower basis of values; the bulk of them changed hands; prices showed an easier trend. Fat lambs, a short supply. Ewes hard to negotiate, unless young and fresh. Proceedings over the day finished up well. A very satisfactory clearance, and substantial volume of business transacted. WEEKLY DAIRY MARKET.

Tuesday, November 2nd—Full seasonable entry; numerically less than last week, including some useful and promising heifers and cows; no outstanding cows on offer, but a good many choice in-calf heifers. There was a strong and representative ring of buyers, and everybody seemed to be a buyer, and wanting the right stamp. Business was marked with a strong and active demand for cows showing promise of proving good milkers, and anything with such qualifications were readily bought up, top prices unhesitatingly being paid; customers attending specially for this class. Strong and sustained demand for anything with promise and quality; advanced rates all round; the supply not being nearly equal to the demand. Choice and promising heifers were in steady demand at satisfactory rates. Business in general wore a bright aspect to the end of day, moving in an active groove. The sale was one of the best of the season. Market practically sold up. Top price for dairy cows was obtained by Mr. R. O'Dea, Drombanna, for a calved cow at £44; closely followed up by Mr. P. Hayes, Pallasgreen, at £43 10s. Top price for in-calf heifers went to Mr. Jos. Shinnors, Grange, at £42 10s. Dairy cows, best, £40 to £44; promising, £31 10s. to £38 10s.; ordinary, £25 to £29 10s.; in-calf and calved heifers, best, £35 to £42 10s.; ordinary, £27 to £34.—Wm. B. Fitt & Co., Auctioneers.
